For watercolor artists, "sketching" means painting on site, using watercolor paints. Dave has a travel palette and a stool he often uses. Sometimes he paints standing up.

Why sketch versus take a photo?

Dave Baab: Sketching asks me to slow down and observe the scene before me closely, emphasizing/exaggerating the parts that excite me or lift my heart to worship. Now than I'm 72 with a chronic lung disease, I'm more aware of how fast life is going and how brief our life span is. Sketching captures a moment in time at a specific place where I am acting spontaneously to what I see, and thus slows down time for a bit. I can later return to this time and place over and over by looking at the sketch I create. I can remember my emotions and what was happening that day.

For me, beauty captures the awe I feel when I encounter the Living God in creation and in Jesus Christ through the scriptures and prayer. "One thing I ask of the Lord, that will I seek after: to live in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to behold the beauty of the Lord, and to inquire at his temple" (Psalm 27:4). I sketch scenes that make me stop and say, "Wow, thank you, Lord," and the one to two hours of paying attention to shapes, values and colors helps cement that emotion into my heart. May this exhibit of some of my sketches lift your heart to our beautiful Lord.



About the Artist: Dave Baab was born in Ohio and attended Ohio State University Dental School. After serving as a Navy dentist on the U.S.S. Enterprise during the Vietnam War, he moved to Seattle to do specialty training in periodontics. He met his wife, Lynne, and they lived 30 years in Seattle. They were involved in various leadership roles at Bethany for 15 years. Dave retired from dentistry when he and Lynne moved to New Zealand in 2007 for Lynne to take a teaching position. As of July, 2017, they are back in Seattle, living in Columbia City close to their beloved granddaughter.


DUCK POND, BOTANIC GDNS.




ENTRANCE, DUNEDIN CHINESE GONS.


INTERIOR, DUNEDIN TRAIN STATION


KUBOTA JAPANESE GARDENS
