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Awake to the ASTONISHING

Keep awake... be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour. (Matthew 24:42,44)

The gospel reading for the first Sunday of Advent is always what some Bible students call the "little apocalypse." Whether in Mark, Luke, or this year Matthew, Jesus is trying to do what the books of Daniel and Revelation try to do: strengthen people's faith in difficult times by dramatizing the hope that God will indeed come to make things right. Apocalyptic narratives seem like doom and gloom to some of us, but they are given not for fright but for instilling courage and resilience. They are designed to "reveal" (*apocalypse* in Greek), to pull the stage curtain back to reveal the larger pieces of God's drama of redemption.

Jesus has been asked by his disciples concerning the Son's glorious return, and Jesus then addresses two pressing concerns: 1) When will these things take place? and 2) What are we to do in the meantime?

To the first question, Jesus makes it clear that no one knows when these things will occur, not even the Son. It always amazes me how dissatisfied some people are with this uncertainty, and feel the need to map out Jesus' second coming with their prognostications.

To the second question – "What are we to do in the meantime?" – Jesus shares three parables about the faithful servant, the wise and foolish virgins, and the talents. The messages can't be missed: stick to your post; bring oil for your lamp, that is, be ready for the long haul of faith; and invest in the kingdom now by

using your gifts.

That's not bad advice when you're waiting for Christ's advent. And to that, Jesus adds one more thing that may be the most important for us this Advent: stay awake. "Be vigilant, you have no idea when the Son of Man is going to show up" (The MESSAGE).

How will you stay awake to the astonishing, surprising ways that Jesus is showing up in our world? Let me offer a few practices:

- Make it a point to come to worship every Sunday of Advent. If you cannot make it in person, attend online. Let the body of Christ help you keep alert.
- Take advantage of the Advent devotionals Bethany provides. We have hard copy scriptural meditations from Frontier Ministries, as well as our three times a week email devotional. The scriptures have a way of keeping us awake.
- Invite a friend to Christmas Eve worship at one of our four services. Our non-church-attending friends are more open to this service than any other, and God does unique things on this candlelit night. Give a friend a space for staying open to the remarkable.
- Volunteer with Wednesday Night Dinner and see the astounding before your eyes.

Christ will show up this season, not only in the manger, but in his Reign. Will you be ready to receive him when he shows up in astonishing ways?

What Grows in the Dark

As the nights become longer and the temperatures drop, the words of author, Parker Palmer on the "paradox of Fall" always come to mind. He writes about how Fall is a season of great beauty, but also a season of decline, yet, "faced with this inevitable winter, what does nature do in autumn? She scatters the seeds that will bring new growth in the spring – and she scatters them with amazing abandon".

In the face of a couple years of multiple, layered pandemics that we have been facing as a world, culture and community here at the Wednesday Night Dinner, it has been easy for me to get lost in the darkness. Yet, I have recently been reminded of the ways of the seeds, which have been scattered in the darkness, that are slowly starting to grow.

The seeds of change are taking root at the WND: in the life of one of our community members, this change is taking the shape of a softening we have noticed. Through his friendship with Tom Oines, this man is sobering up and seeking help to find housing and medical care. The seeds of change are taking root at the community-level: just last night we served food indoors and on plates for the first time in almost 3 years. The energy of the room was one of vibrancy, connection, joy and a real sense of community.

The seeds of change are growing within me: seeing this community come together week after week, such eclectic and unique individuals who make up the whole, reminds me of the beauty and resilience of humans, even in the face of challenge. Looking more deeply, in these dark days, I can see, as Parker Palmer writes, "the myriad possibilities being planted to bear fruit in some season yet to come." I am grateful the WND is stepping into a new season of dining on plates indoors, and I simply can't wait to witness what kinds of fruit God grows in our midst.

At long last, Bethany's Young Adult Ministry (BPYA) has migrated indoors. While we are incredibly grateful to Misty and David Grieger for 3 winters of outdoor hospitality (read: heaters & blankets), we are thrilled that COVID's easing now allows us to be warm and comfortable inside. If you laughed at the John Wesley "dad joke" heading this paragraph, please see me on Sunday, because I owe you a high-five.

Bad jokes aside, BPYA continues our anchoring rhythm of twice-monthly gatherings on Wednesday nights for dinner, connection, and intentional conversation. With 20+ young adults showing up for the last two months, we've been learning how to be a "big group" and are testing just how many people we can pack into the Grieger's living room. Topically, we wrapped up our long series on sex, sexuality, and dating and have been exploring ethics. Here are some questions that guide our "wrestling with wonder":

What does it mean to live faithfully? How do we live in freedom and yet protect one another from the harm we can do? Where do we chafe at "the rules" of our faith, and what does that tell us? Is moral relativism a dangerous disease, ethically neutral, or neither? And, what does Mark 2:23-25 have to say about that?

Aside from addressing these small, easy questions, a dozen of us took our annual retreat in October, where we enjoyed playing games, cooking for one another, the rhythms of daily office liturgy, and some fascinating conversation about meaningful rest. Finally, a smaller group of us are enjoying a monthly Bible study, where we engage scripture honestly and thoughtfully.

The theme this fall for both middle and high school was 'Community Rooted in Christ'. I spent much time discussing with leaders and students this past summer and felt this was a topic that would be important for us to focus on (little did I know the entire church was also discussing 'Belonging' so it fit together perfectly!).

This fall, we had fixed small groups, meaning students were together with the same group every week. The hope was that this would help cultivate a smaller and more intimate group that they could discuss life and BPYG talks with. My hope is that students enjoyed this and had a chance to connect with people in that space.

As I have reflected on the past few months, I have felt compelled to reframe what I believe ministry should be right now. Last week I watched a <u>New York Times video</u> that examined the 'Great Teacher Resignation' which has left most schools in the US in crisis. It is a very intriguing video for anyone to watch, but especially those who are around students. The video ends with a haunting set of lines that have stuck with me since: 'When we have no adult in the classroom it sends a message directly to the kids. And that is, no one really cares about me.'

It's no bold claim to suggest that students of all ages are incredibly vulnerable to a whole host of issues right now (maybe more so now than ever before) whether they be mental, social, emotional, academic, physical, etc. Which has led me to shift my understanding of what really matters right now. It seems students need less focus on dogmatics (not that that isn't important or relevant) and more people they know who actually care about them.

So, I would like to leave you with a challenge or something to ponder during this season: How are you showing our students you care? This isn't a question just for the adults, but also for you students – how are you caring for your friends? Both students inside and outside of the BPYG community? This is a question I am pondering myself this week and this season.

Above all, my prayer is that we might not forget the hope we have in Christ amidst the unknown. It actually makes me think of the song from Frozen: <u>'Into the Unknown'</u> – and may we remember that, as we walk into the unknown, we walk not only with Christ, but with each other.
