I was glad when they said to me, "Let us go into the house of the LORD!" Psalm 122:1

Are you feeling the Autumn season? As I am writing this piece for the Briefs, I am experiencing the first fall rain. It is the lovely light Seattle drizzle that I have come to enjoy (something I could never have said eleven years ago before I moved to the Northwest). We are searching for our jackets which have been tucked away for a while. Pumpkin Spice-everything season is upon us. Beautiful challah and other special treats for the Jewish High Holy Days are rolling out in all the local bakeries. And of course, what would the fall season be without college football? My Cal Bears just played against the Huskies (are you grieving the demise of the Pac 12 as I am?).

Or could it be that you are being led to our music ministry? Whatever the tug is that you may be feeling, nothing gets activated until you step from the sideline and onto the field.

Mending Wings is a non-profit ministry that exists to "empower and heal Native youth through leadership development, cultural retention and revitalization programs, and spirituality. The "Dancing our Prayers" ministry are teams of Native teens who travel locally, regionally and nationally sharing their cul-

ture, spirituality and way of life. The youth and staff of Mending Wings drum & dance

in full regalia, perform drama, give testimony, and speak on conciliation issues between Native and non-Native America. Their Executive Director, Corey Greaves, will be preaching that morning.

Outreach Ministry Updates

UPDATE ON ESPERANZA TRIP - Esperanza is a ministry on the northwest side of Vancouver Island in British Columbia. They seek to be a place of hope, refuge, and service in the name of Jesus to First Nations people in the surrounding areas.



From July 15 - 22, a group of 14 folks from Bethany, Elim Baptist, and a church in Surrey, Canada, spent a week at Esperanza. Most of us have been going to Esperanza together for years, so it was great to spend time with friends as well as return to Esperanza after a forced break due to Covid. Esperanza is going through a lot of changes right now, and has very few staff on site. Our small group was a good fit this year - it's much harder to accommodate a large group and have appropriate projects when you are already on a shoestring budget and staff.

We had two main projects this year: a team worked on the fuel tanks that supply the fuel

dock, and a team cleaned and prepped camp for the youth overnight summer camp that was scheduled for the week after we left. Jane Frissell was in charge of the kitchen and has a rotating group of folks helping her. There were also smaller projects such as splitting wood, painting new signs for the fuel dock, etc.

We had a wonderful time - it was so good to return to a place that has provided such good memories. Bethany members have been going to Esperanza since the 70's, and we hope to continue that tradition for many more years. Sunday Kids Program. This summer we saw an uptick in kid attendance from last summer. Each morning we were led by Carlos or patient volunteers who taught songs to the elemen-



tary class. After music we would answer small group questions based on the children's message, then play. For the last five Sundays of summer, kids and adults were drawn into a Bible story with the pieces, backgrounds, and captivating storytelling of Godly Play. In the Parlor we would ask our Wondering Questions, sing, then play indoors and outdoors.



Vacation Bible Camp. This was truly an epic week of fun, community, and learning. Once again, I am so thankful to the 55 youth and adult volunteers who dedicated so much time and energy to hosting our 44 campers. Over half the volunteers were youth! Every morning, families entered the building under a rainbow arch and flying bubbles, welcomed by a loving community, and nurtured through conversation, play, and art. The theme for this week was "God's Masterpiece." We explored the many gifts God has given each one of us for the building up of God's kingdom. I hope each child and volunteer left every afternoon knowing that God loves them, everyone has special gifts, and a curiosity about how to use their talents and interests to better the world.

Young Adults Wander the Wilderness (And Much More)

OFF TO TACQUOMA

The third weekend of August, coffees in hand (and definitely sleepy), a small group of young adults gathered by 7:00am at the White River Ranger Station to pick up permits for our second annual backpacking trip! This year, seven of us backpacked on a portion of the Wonderland Trail and Northern Loop Trail for three days and two nights. Highlights include: dinner & sunset on top of Skyscraper Peak with 360-degree views of Tahoma (Mount Rainier) and the surrounding mountains; celebrating Steven Westburg's birthday at Fire Creek Camp; deepening our spiritual community through plenty of laughter & no lack of deep conversation and communal question-asking.

This year, our theme was wilderness (Too on the nose? Nah!). We each shared about a personal wilderness space we're experiencing, and together

explored Biblical and theological frameworks for "making sense" of our wilderness spaces. We wondered together how God is providing, making space, testing, sharpening, and clarifying amidst our unique life experiences. We wondered together how to endure the pain & suffering of life's wildernesses—how does lament help us clearly see the landscape we're in? How do celebration and gratitude gift us with eyes to see the path ahead?

Postscript: you may have noticed the reference to Tahoma rather than Mount Rainier. Decolonization efforts are returning native names to our region's great peaks. Peter Rainier, for whom Tahoma was renamed, never actually laid eyes on the mountain historically known to the Puyallup as təqwu?mə? (Tacquoma). As we see throughout Scripture, names matter—Jesus names Simon Cephas in John I; the riverside place Peniel is named in Gen 32:30 for Jacob's wrestling. Perhaps this is an invitation for us to consider as we move through a world of named places.
